The overarching theme driving the many programs and initiatives of the Membership Development Group over the 2021-22 season has been one of ‘rebuilding’.

The dedication of everyone who contributes their time, expertise and energy to serving our membership is reflected in the numbers below.

2021-22 Season Highlights of the Membership Group in Numbers

- Intercollegiate team skating: More than 1,000 athletes, 93 teams.
- 74 registered high school teams.
- 2021 National Showcase Competition had more than 1,100 starts.
- 14 collegiate synchronized teams competed in qualifying competitions.
- Solo dance: Increased number of overall competitions in series to encourage participation and help skaters minimize pressure to travel.
- Theatre On Ice (TOI) organized the first-ever National Theatre On Ice Summer Series to keep TOI teams engaged across the country.
- 2022 Solo Dance Camp in February: more than 90 participants, up 30 percent from prior camp.
- 2022 Excel Series is underway with more than 1,200 registered athletes, up nearly 80 percent from the last fully ‘live’ season, 2019, and up over 100 percent from 2021.
- Adult Competition Series: 43 registered skaters.
- More than 30 opportunities for athletes to engage through the new Icemen Ambassadors program.
- Grass-roots membership: Learn to Skate USA on target to have highest membership year to date with more than 100,000 new Learn to Skate USA members registered in a single season for the first time ever!
- More than 700 individuals registered for the new Alumni Connect program within first month of launching.
- More than 45 virtual and live engagements and trainings held across the committees of the Membership Development Group.

As the numbers above reflect, recovery from the 2020-21 season, during which most programs and their associated competitions were either canceled or forced to pivot to virtual experiences, has been strong across the landscape of U.S. Figure Skating programs and opportunities. However, the work of the volunteers and staff who supported the Membership Development Group this season has been far more impactful than numbers on a page.

Their efforts provided scaffolding that supported rebuilding our membership’s connection to the sport, rekindling personal connections within the skating community, and restoring athletes’ mental well-being and physical strength. Athletes are thrilled to be back on the ice competing, and parents have been sincerely grateful that their children are able to reengage with the sport and reconnect with skating friends.

I encourage you to take the time to read the reports that follow as they provide a deep dive into the recent and current work of the Membership Development Group.

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It is an honor to serve alongside this tireless, dedicated team. My sincere appreciation and thank you to the volunteer leadership, committee members and U.S. Figure Skating headquarters staff members who support the Membership Development Group.

Adult Skating Committee – Aviva Cantor, Chair

I'm grateful for the opportunity to share everything that the Adult Skating Committee (ASC) has accomplished this season. We tackled some unfinished business that was delayed due to the nontraditional structure of the 2019-20 and 2020-21 seasons. Additionally, we explored some new ideas and concepts.

Leadership Team

- The Adult Skating Committee hosted a very successful marketing table at the 2022 U.S. Figure Skating Championships in Nashville. This was our most popular table yet. We gained 148 Instagram followers in less than three days. We were so popular that we rapidly ran out of swag items and had to get more from headquarters. The support we received from both the adult skating community and from headquarters was remarkable. We are incredibly proud of this effort.
- The Athletes Advisory Committee reached out to us regarding the definition of “actively engaged athletes” and what this will mean for adult athlete representation on non-designated committees. This criteria is a work in progress, and we will continue to provide guidance as needed.
- The Tests Committee reached out to us to ask about adding more adult tests to the list of tests that can be taken with IJS protocol. While we have concluded that no additional adult tests should be added at this time, we are open to exploring this again in the future.
- We recorded an “Intro to Adult Testing” webinar for adult skaters.
- We hosted a live “Intro to Adult Skating” webinar for high school and collegiate skaters.
- We hosted a live “Intro to Adult IJS” webinar for singles competitors.
- **Agenda items for after March 1:**
 - We will hold a brainstorming session on how we can make a better effort to recognize the volunteers at the U.S. Adult Championships and adult sectional championships.
 - We will host live “Intro to Adult IJS” webinars for pairs and ice dance competitors.

Athlete Services and Technical

- We submitted the following ballot items:
 - Provided clarification in the oversight of adult showcase event content. Based on ballot feedback, we chose not to move forward with the request for action.
 - Restructured competitive partnered dance to split up partnered pattern dance and partnered free dance, refresh the dance rotation, change the number of dances performed and create adult preliminary dance. These changes allow for more flexibility and opportunities for teams. The Dance Development and Technical Committee and the Rules Committee were consulted prior to balloting.
 - Added a choreographic element to the free dance for championship adult dance, adult pre-gold dance, adult gold dance and masters open dance. This was based on athlete feedback.
 - Removed the requirement for an adult dance team to move up in level if they win adult pre-bronze dance at the U.S. Adult Figure Skating Championships.
 - Updated the twizzle requirements in adult gold solo free dance event to match the requirements for the standard, adult 21+ and adult 50+ senior solo free dance tests.
 - Added the adult pre-bronze solo pattern dance event to the rulebook.
- We discussed the possibility of adding a championship adult gold solo dance event to the U.S. Adult Figure Skating Championships, with potential implementation during the 2023-24 season. While the interest is generally favorable, we still need to determine if there is truly time for this event.
- We created and published the 2021-22 Adult Calling Clarifications.

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- We performed our annual review of the Adult Special Achievement Awards and made a slight adjustment to the criteria.
- **Agenda items for later this season:**
 - We will create a grandfathering chart for adult pairs skating.

Learn to Skate USA and Nonqualifying

- We had a great turnout of 43 athletes registered for the 2021-22 Adult Competition Series. This competitive opportunity is offered exclusively to skaters at the adult 1 through adult bronze levels, meaning that this population not only began skating as adults, but also has the remarkable courage to get out there and compete.
- We hosted a webinar to help promote the newly revamped Adult Competition Series.
- We are actively administering the Adult Competition Series and will be sending a reminder email this fall.
- We maintained adult nonqualifying and Compete USA competition templates with the Competitions Committee.
- We discussed the addition of Special Olympics and Skate United events to the Adult Competition Series. This discussion was met with an overwhelmingly positive response. We will soon be reaching out to the Adaptive Skating Subcommittee to determine the next steps.
- **Agenda items for later this season:**
 - We will review and update the Adult Competition Series Handbook for next season.
 - We will calculate points and award Adult Competition Series trophies at the 2022 Adult Sectional Championships.

Community Support and Development

- We created the 2022 Skate Forever Strong campaign in January, promoting off-ice fitness on social media.
- Three athletes received Skate Forever Young Awards at the 2022 Eastern Synchronized Skating Sectional Championships.
- At 2022 Eastern Adult Sectional Championships, an athlete will become the first Adult Competition Series participant to receive a Skate Forever Young Award.
- For the first time, we are slated to have a repeat winner of the Yvonne M. Dowlen Trophy. This trophy is awarded annually to the oldest athlete at the U.S. Adult Figure Skating Championships.
- We will continue having the youngest athlete present the Yvonne M. Dowlen Trophy. This tradition began in 2019 and has been well-received by the community.
- In the spring, we will provide annual adult trophy updates to the museum.
- We have brainstormed ways to expand the Lifetime Competitor Recognition Program (particularly for adult synchronized skating) and will be reaching out to headquarters for assistance.
- We plan to brainstorm more ways to bridge the gap between the adult synchronized community and the rest of the adult skating community. What can be done to connect these people?

Membership Committee – Terri Levine, Chair

Good News! Membership is returning to pre-pandemic levels. Total membership to date is up significantly versus FY2021 and is slightly ahead of where we were in FY2020 before the pandemic shut everything down. Full membership is a little lower than February 2020 but up versus last year at this time, so while we are not quite there yet, we are definitely recovering.

The most encouraging news is the Learn to Skate USA new members which are dramatically higher than they were at the same time in February 2020 and almost three times higher than last year at this time. The Learn to Skate USA renewals are significantly higher than last year but still lower than 2020.

The tools that the Membership Committee developed and implemented this year were a result of the committee working as a team; brainstorming over Zoom, and using Basecamp to help develop and fine tune the ideas. The goal was to address the needs of all of the clubs to help build and maintain membership. Additionally, the chair reached out to other committees and U.S. Figure Skating leadership for their input and assessment of issues that our members and clubs are facing and how the Membership Committee can help.

INITIATIVES THAT HAVE BEEN IMPLEMENTED

Club Education

Based on the success of the Zoom Club Education webinars last year, the format was continued into this season. The goal continues to be to increase engagement with club leadership. The use of Zoom webinars enabled greater outreach to the clubs. So far this season we have held five Club Education webinars focusing on programming and EMS. The Zoom webinars are recorded and posted on the Members Only site for those who have been unable to attend.

The online format will be continued in the 2022-23 season. An in-person session with totally different materials and a social component will be presented at Governing Council.

Club Leadership Handbook

Recognizing that it takes time and energy for our club officials to run a successful club, the committee is in the process of finalizing the Club Leadership Handbook. It contains links to the appropriate pages on the Members Only site with the important information for club leadership. The document will contain everything from “how to start a club” to the makings of a strong club, including timelines, a checklist for success, and information for parents.

Clubs Matter Newsletters

The monthly newsletters are full of information for clubs and are sent to all registered club board members. The committee has continued to develop ideas and incentives for our clubs to offer to their members to encourage membership renewal and engagement. The focus is on providing clubs with the information they need to run successful programs and events such as National Skating Month and support for the Olympic Winter Games Beijing 2022.

The Destination Beijing Toolkit

The committee developed a “toolkit” for U.S. Figure Skating clubs to use that involve skaters at all levels, coaches and parents to get the Olympic spirit going to raise awareness of our Olympic skaters. The Destination Beijing Club Toolkit offered clubs ideas and activities designed to inspire everyone to cheer on Team USA and support our athletes and our sport. The toolkit included on- and off-ice event ideas that could be tailored to all levels and ages. There were also community outreach materials to help make watching the events more enjoyable.

The toolkit was sent as an e-blast to all club leaders in the Clubs Matter Newsletter, National Skating Month event contacts and the Membership Committee with links to the resources on the Members Only site.

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The 360° Challenge

What is the 360° Challenge? For those of us who watch snowboarding and freestyle skiing, we hear the announcers and commentators get all excited when someone does a 360° or 720° or even a 960°. And while it is impressive, their athletes are doing this by coming down a hill or gaining speed in a pipeline. Our skaters are generating that many degrees of rotation and more using their own bodies, but we don't talk about it that way. We talk about doubles, triples and quads. Most people have no concept of how many degrees of rotation are involved in our jumps. Our skaters are doing 720's, 960's, 1080's and 1440's. Rotations the other sports don't even have the vocabulary for.

Objective: To engage figure skaters and fans using social media and present the "How do you 360°?" allowing athletes to participate by posting videos of them executing their 360's or more on Instagram, Facebook or Twitter.

Benefits: The TV viewership ratings for the Tokyo Olympics were way down. The time difference and when the events were aired — some of which the results were already known — were not a good omen for any U.S. sports for the events in Beijing. It was in our best interests to get our athletes at the grass-roots level involved so that they would watch the games.

The Campaign: Are you ready for the [#WinterOlympics](#)? Introducing the 360 Challenge. On the ground or on the ice, post a video of you doing your favorite spin or jump using [#ShowUsYour360](#) and let's fill social media with excitement for [#Beijing2022](#) and our sport.

In the first nine hours we had nearly 10,000 views on the Insta video. To date, the campaign has reached more than 1,500 people on Facebook, has 270 posts on Instagram and has more than 40,000 views on Twitter. Every segment of our sport joined in on the fun from Learn to Skate USA programs, singles, pairs, ice dance and synchronized teams.

If you're wondering why 360° and not 720°? The 720 Challenge is already being done by a credit rating company.

Virtual Skating Showcase

A four-minute video virtual skating performance showcasing skaters of all ages, levels and abilities from across the United States premiered at Governing Council and could then be used by clubs for 2021-22 season renewals. It was posted on social media to broaden the reach and can be viewed here <https://youtu.be/2TxrZ5Qg58M>.

Alumni Connect

A new alumni program for current and former members of U.S. Figure Skating

This has been one of our strategic initiatives that Elise, Susi and headquarters staff have been working on. The objective is to bring U.S. Figure Skating alumni back into the U.S. Figure Skating family with events to strengthen the connection to each other and to the association in a fun and meaningful way. With local happy hours, bucket-list skating adventures, professional networking opportunities and an online community, Alumni Connect members will have the chance forge friendships and build connections with current and former figure skaters across the country.

The Campaign: The effort was launched using Facebook <https://www.facebook.com/groups/httpswww.usfigureskating.org/>

In less than a month there are 771 people who have signed up for the Facebook group.

FitSkate

Another strategic plan objective was to develop tools to support skating for fitness and fun. FitSkate is targeted toward current or former competitive, professional and recreational skaters alike to enjoy the benefits of a workout program while utilizing on-ice skills. The program includes high-intensity interval training methods with on-ice skating techniques to create fun and effective total body workouts that are inclusive for all skaters. A FitSkate Manual has been developed with detailed information about the program design, how FitSkate works, requirements for instructor qualifications, and tips on class organization and how to work with varying levels of participant skills. Also included are four-week, six-week and eight-week curriculums, and images of all of the exercises in the program.

There are definitely sponsorship opportunities here as so many companies have products that dovetail nicely with a fitness program targeted to adults.

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Conclusion

I would like to thank the members of the committee for all of their work this past year. It has not been an easy one. They approached the issues with creativity, diligence and professionalism. A special thank you to Elise Preston, our group coordinator, the headquarters staff, especially Kathy Dreves, and to Susi Wehrli McLaughlin, our headquarters liaison; without her leadership the committee would not function as well as it does.

It has been a busy and productive year for the Adaptive Skating Subcommittee. Here is what we accomplished:

- Built an adaptive skating website with U.S. Figure Skating to provide an easier location to provide information to membership.
- Updated and standardized competition events for all adaptive skaters in various levels and disciplines.
- Presented at a wellness session for the American Public Health Association (APHA) on adaptive ice skating in November 2021.
- Building database of skaters and coaches who engage in adaptive skating through a new membership option within Members Only.
- Submitted five requests for action for Governing Council focusing on adding Skate United to ice dance and pairs testing and competition, and to the synchronized skating test qualifications and age requirements chart.
- Composed a clinical team to review and write Skating Accommodation Memorandum (S.A.M.) requests.
- Pre-recorded a session for the Professional Skaters Association on adaptive skating for the May 2022 Professional Skaters Association Summit in Chicago

Things we are working on for the future:

- Seated badge and competition curriculum.

A consistent theme is the return of enthusiasm within each one of their programs. You will find within most of their reports quite a bit of detail and ongoing development that might be unexpected.

Each one of these subcommittees was forced to reimagine how to create virtual experiences, and share in the disappointment of cancellation of their respective major competitive events in 2020 and 2021. Each subcommittee shares a common thread of efforts made in outreach to their program's constituency. Individually, but collectively in thought, each vice chair realized that connection to their membership was vital to us not losing members due to inactivity. I encourage you to read the reports from each of these dynamically different programs. Another common thread is the enthusiasm the athletes have as they are beginning to experience the expanded ways to participate and the re-emergence of live on-ice events.

To all of those wonderful staff members we have at U.S. Figure Skating, I and my vice chairs could not do any of our work without your support. Thank you for your assistance and your advice. You make our jobs so much easier.

Finally, this completes my second year as chair of this wonderful committee. I have chosen to step away as chair in order to concentrate on other priorities in my life, mostly family and grand children. These two years have been a great treasure as I have witnessed incredible vice chairs and their committee members take on the task of managing their areas of expertise in such a difficult time. Their spirit and creativeness are a testament to their programs being able to shift gears, shift focus and, in the end, manage a much improved group of services for our members. Collegiate Skating Subcommittee – Scott Brody, National Vice Chair

I am honored to be in my second year as national vice chair of the Collegiate Skating Subcommittee. All pertinent updates to the collegiate skating programs can be found below in this report.

Season Update

No in-person events were able to take place during the 2020-21 season for both the intercollegiate competition series and collegiate/open collegiate synchronized skating due to the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic. We were very fortunate to be able to return to holding a full in-person competition season for all our collegiate programming during the past year with appropriate safety measures in place. The athletes were so thrilled and appreciative to be back on the ice and at competitions again.

Intercollegiate Team Skating

Intercollegiate Sectional Competitions this season were hosted by Massachusetts Institute of Technology, Boston University, New York University, Princeton University, Liberty University, University of Delaware, Western Michigan University, Trine University, Miami University, University of Denver, Colorado State University, and University of California Los Angeles. The 2022 National Intercollegiate Final was hosted by Adrian College. Results from intercollegiate competitions can be found on [U.S. Figure Skating Fanzone](#).

More than 1,000 athletes on 94 intercollegiate teams competed across the United States during the 2021-22 intercollegiate season. Right now, the greatest weakness of the intercollegiate program is registration technology. Intercollegiate registration is currently run manually through Microsoft Excel. More than 3,000 competition starts from 13 different competitions each year must be processed, vetted for event eligibility based on self-reported test levels, team rosters verified for academic eligibility, individual athlete compliance checked, team compliance checked, as well as ensuring each team is up to date on their collegiate club and intercollegiate team registration. The whole process is extremely time-consuming, prone to errors, and makes it difficult to track data. When the intercollegiate program was much smaller, the size and data were much more manageable. Thankfully we have seen tremendous growth in the program, but in turn that has caused increases in time spent on registration management. We would like to get the intercollegiate program onto EMS next season and have begun discussions with Product Support. By having intercollegiate registration managed through EMS, we can have the everything tied to the database and

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track skaters in this program to see the full pipeline of competition history as U.S. Figure Skating members. Additionally, it will provide more consistency for the teams and efficiency for headquarters staff and committee members.

Synchronized Skating

There were 14 collegiate teams entered to compete during the 2021-22 qualifying season. Based on the advancement criteria as well as approved byes, the following teams competed at the 2022 U.S. Synchronized Skating Championships in the collegiate division: Adrian College, Boston College, Boston University, Liberty University, Miami University, Michigan State University, Team Excel, Trine University, University of Delaware, University of Illinois, University of Massachusetts, University of Michigan, and Western Michigan University. In the open collegiate division, seven teams competed at the Midwestern Synchronized Skating Sectional Championships, and three teams competed at the Eastern Synchronized Skating Sectional Championships. Both Miami University and Adrian College had senior teams named to Team USA this season. Results from synchronized skating competitions can be found on [U.S. Figure Skating Fanzone](#).

The Vicki Korn Trophy was created this season for the annual winner of the collegiate team event at the U.S. Synchronized Skating Championships. The trophy was donated by Devon Hensel and Karin Sherr in memory of Vicki Korn, member of the U.S. Figure Skating Hall of Fame Class of 2022 and pioneer of collegiate skating.

Collegiate Championships

As you will see in the 2022 Governing Council Meeting Book, there were three items balloted this season regarding the U.S. Collegiate Championships. The way that this event has been held is not financially viable long term. Year after year, it is difficult to find an LOC interested in hosting due to the small number of events and the staffing requirements for officials. After the 2018-19 season, the intermediate and novice levels were removed from the U.S. Figure Skating Championships. The U.S. Collegiate Championships did not follow suit, and these levels have had the lowest entries of the competition. Additionally, there has been little to no interest in the pairs and ice dance events.

To increase the success of the event, we proposed removing intermediate and novice singles as well as all pairs and ice dance events from the qualifying event, and adding the U.S. Collegiate Figure Skating Invitational, a nonqualifying competition for college students. The nonqualifying competition would include singles short programs (juvenile through novice), Excel free skate, solo pattern dance, and solo free dance events. By adding a nonqualifying invitational portion, this will expand the number of opportunities for collegiate athletes to a wider population, leading to a more financially viable event that can be held as a standalone competition in the future rather than pairing it with a summer nonqualifying competition.

The site for the 2022 U.S. Collegiate Championships is planned to be announced by mid-April 2022 and then the 2023 site will be announced by the time of the 2022 event.

Outreach and Engagement

Our subcommittee and the Collegiate Ambassador Program launched an Instagram account ([@uscollegiateskating](#)) on Nov. 9, 2020. Since the launch, we were very excited to see the rapid growth and interest from the skating community. The account has reached **3,913** followers (as of Feb. 25, 2022). Our target audience is prospective collegiate skaters in high school, current and past collegiate skaters, as well as their friends and family. The account aims to educate our followers on the opportunities available to continue or start skating in college, provide a glimpse into the life of collegiate skaters via account takeovers, highlight the hard work of intercollegiate and collegiate synchronized skating teams from across the country, and highlight [blog posts written by the Collegiate Ambassadors](#).

We were very fortunate to host several in-person Collegiate Skating Workshops this winter in conjunction with various high school and collegiate skating events. These were led either by members of the Collegiate Ambassador Program or leadership from the Collegiate Skating Subcommittee. Workshops were held in Orleans, Massachusetts, (Feb. 13, 2022), Park Ridge, Illinois, (Feb. 20, 2022), Lakewood, California, (March 6, 2022), Schofield, Wisconsin, (March 13, 2022), and Newark, Delaware (March 13, 2022).

Many thanks to vice chairs Hannah Herring (intercollegiate) and Ashley Korn (synchronized), the entire Collegiate Skating Subcommittee, as well as Sarah Arnold, Susi Wehrli McLaughlin, Kelly Vogtner, Megan Romeo and Kyleigh Gaff at U.S. Figure Skating headquarters.

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High School Programs Subcommittee – Rebecca Nagle, National Vice Chair

Overview

There were 74 registered high school teams during the 2021-22 season, compared to 80 from the 2020-21 season. At the beginning of the season, the U.S. Figure Skating high school figure skating program increased committee membership under existing vice chair leadership to support the growing program. Additionally, the committee began partnering with a new staff liaison at headquarters, the manager for school and alumni programs. This increased support allowed the committee to focus on several key initiatives this year.

Program Audit

From June through October, the subcommittee audited and revised all documentation for the program. This audit was conducted to address two main issues. First, the audit allowed the subcommittee to further align with U.S. Figure Skating collegiate programming in order to create continuity and a smooth transition between the programs. Second, the subcommittee desired to create a more user-friendly website for coaches, parents, and skaters in order to provide a positive introduction and complete understanding of the U.S. Figure Skating high school skating programming.

The audit had two parts: 1. Review of program requirements, and 2. Creation/revision of web materials. The most notable modification to program requirements was regarding the mandate to obtain permission from athletics directors or schools of officials for school-affiliated clubs to operate. This language was revised to “optional” in order to increase ease of student-athlete participation. However, permission from school administrators is still encouraged by the program in order to build sport awareness at the high school level. Following the review of program requirements, the high school Web page was updated to allow ease in locating information on various topics, such as “How to Start a Team”, “How to Run a Competition”, FAQs, the revised handbook, and a new competition announcement template following the structure of the standard nonqualifying announcement template created by the Competitions Committee. Once these changes were made, U.S. Figure Skating sanction officers were advised to promote competitive continuity nationwide in all high school events.

Awareness & Outreach

In the fall, virtual informational webinars were held for skaters, parents, and coaches along with presentations on the three vice president’s calls. Additionally, information was sent out via the PSA so that the coaching community becomes aware of the importance of and increasing interest in high school skating.

Virtual Events

The subcommittee is currently in the process of hosting the U.S. Figure Skating High School Cyber Challenge Cup and is seeing similar participation to the previous year, with an increase in the number of states represented, suggesting that this virtual event continues to be a strong marketing tool for the program. The two-part series incorporated a team maneuvers event in January, and an upcoming artistic event in March, accompanied by a Team Spirit Video contest this month.

At the end of the virtual series and team spirit awards, the committee intends to review and track the number of teams registered over the past two years. From this data, a geographical map will be created to identify where participation is nationwide. This will help locate hotspot areas that can be targeted to increase marketing and create future competitive events, such as next season’s sectional competitive events that may replace the U.S. Figure Skating High School Cyber Challenge Cup.

Graduating Seniors Program

The committee was very pleased with participation in the Graduating Seniors Program this year, with pins requested across all levels — gold, silver, and bronze.

Recommendations for the 2022-23 Season

- Continue to increase program awareness through a targeted communication campaign. Items may include:
 - Marketing to coaches — consider providing a seminar at the annual PSA Summit.
 - Collaborating with the Collegiate Skating Subcommittee for consistent marketing tactics and messaging to create pipelines for retention.
 - Partnering with headquarters staff to utilize social media and email marketing tactics.
- Celebrate student athletes by encouraging schools to present graduating seniors pins to skaters at athletic banquets or other school functions.
- Develop opportunities for in-person competitions nationwide.
- Incorporate student-athlete voices into the programming, such as developing student-athlete representative positions on the High School Programs Subcommittee or a High School Skater Ambassadors program.

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National Showcase Subcommittee – Daren Patterson, National Vice Chair

The showcase community came back to national competition in a big way! Fort Collins, Colorado, hosted the National Showcase Competition from August 3-7, 2021, with 1,133 starts in this record-breaking, five-day competition. Athletes, spectators, officials and volunteers joined together with masks and applause to cheer on skaters returning to competition after a two-year hiatus.

The Showcase Subcommittee released the 2022 guidelines with a few improvements learned over the 2021 season. The showcase community is looking forward to seeing an increased participation rate at nonqualifying competitions, as more and more nonqualifying competitions offer showcase events, judged under the component judging system.

Skaters continue to qualify for the 2022 National Showcase Competition to be held in Wesley Chapel, Florida, hosted by the Champions' Edge Skating Club.

Program Innovation Subcommittee – Marc Weitzman, National Vice Chair

Excel

The re-imagined 2021 Excel Series concluded in early June with more than 600 skaters registering to join the series in both live and virtual competitions. On June 23 and June 28, the committee hosted a virtual festival open to all series entrants, parents and coaches. This year's virtual festival included a keynote address by Ashley Cain-Gribble and Timothy LeDuc, a yoga class with Madison Hubbell, a hip-hop class with Adam Blake, Q&A with Team USA athletes, and an IJS session. Skaters were also able to enter a pre-festival interpretive competition, and Team USA skaters announced the winners during the closing ceremonies.

In August, we were thrilled to hold the 2021 Excel National Festival in Strongsville, Ohio. The event brought together 278 athletes from across the country with COVID-19 protocols in place. The festival consisted of an invitation-only series final for skaters qualifying during the series, an open-invitation series final for skaters in open events, and an open-invitation Compete USA competition. In addition, a camp was offered to qualifying athletes consisting of IJS, dance, skating skills and Team USA meet and greets, as well as parents and coaches education. The feedback from the event has been overwhelmingly positive.

Currently, the 2022 Excel Series is underway with more than 1,000 registered athletes in levels from Excel beginner through Excel senior. This number has far surpassed the number in both 2019 and 2021, and we look forward to the number increasing. The committee selected 54 competitions across the country between January and June to act as official series competitions. Skaters who sign up for the series must participate in at least two series competitions to be eligible to qualify for the National Excel Festival. This year's festival will take place July 14-17, 2022, in Norwood, Massachusetts, at The Skating Club of Boston. The festival will consist of an invitation-only series final for skaters qualifying during the series, and an open-invitation series final for skaters in open events. In addition, a camp will be offered to all athletes consisting of on-ice and off-ice components which will be finalized this spring.

Special thank you to Elise Preston, vice chair of Excel, for her tireless efforts in redesigning and promoting Excel for this season.

Icemen

The Icemen Program serves to attract and retain male figure skaters by building a supportive community inclusive of athletes, parents, officials and fans of figure skating. The Icemen Program is committed to changing the narrative, as figure skating is for everyone.

The program is run with the guidance and support of our Icemen Ambassadors: Evan Bates, dance; Jason Brown, singles; Joon Soo Kim, collegiate; Stephen Murray, synchronized; Michael Parsons, dance; Camden Pulkinen, singles; Sean Rabbitt, singles; and Andrew Torgashev, singles.

Throughout the year our Icemen Ambassadors took over the U.S. Figure Skating Instagram account for Instagram Live events including off-ice training and Q&A sessions. The program also held monthly Icemen hangouts on Zoom where two ambassadors interviewed one another and also took questions from our members, with the highlight coming in June when Icemen held a Father's Day hangout featuring Icemen Ambassadors Jason Brown and Evan Bates, along with their fathers. It was amazing to hear their insights, see their unconditional love and support, and learn how they helped navigate the skating journey.

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In addition, Icemen has one ambassador per month write an article featured in SKATING Magazine discussing their journey in the sport and encouraging the use of hashtag #IcemenSkate.

For 2022-23, we plan to return to hosting Icemen socials at selected competitions throughout the summer. In addition, Icemen is launching a pen-pal program where our Icemen members will have the opportunity to correspond with the ambassadors to seek advice and guidance on navigating their skating journeys. Icemen will also continue to offer live virtual interactions with the ambassadors as well as encourage more of our young athletes to join the program through email marketing outreach. We also will increase visibility and branding by making Icemen merchandise available for purchase on the website.

A big thank you to Matthew O'Toole for his tireless efforts in promoting Icemen and working on its expansion.

Finally, I would like to thank all members of my committee and everyone at U.S. Figure Skating headquarters, especially Kari and Susi for all the work they have done with this subcommittee to develop programs for our athletes.

Solo Dance Subcommittee – John Millier, National Vice Chair

With the pandemic still very much in play, the Solo Dance Series amended some of its requirements to allow skaters to qualify for the final with perhaps less travel. We also changed to qualifying using IJS scores for the first time, which we felt was a success, and we will continue this in the future. Our numbers were very strong considering we had just canceled the entire season the prior year, and the final was a huge success.

We are looking to run our program in 2022 as usual with more events than ever before already on the calendar. We are allowing for as many events to take place as possible in the hopes that there are more opportunities to compete closer to home and avoid potentially more risky travel. The final will be in Santa Clarita this September, and we are very much looking forward to working with a very enthusiastic and hard-working LOC.

We have recently worked with the Dance Development and Technical Committee to help them update the solo free dance test rules to align more closely with competition requirements. We have also identified the need to clarify the wording of the standard expected for each level.

We have a few items are still in being discussed:

1. A proposal to present to the U.S. Figure Skating Technical Panel Management Subcommittee two new appointments: solo dance technical controller (TC) and solo dance technical specialist (TS). All current and future dance TCs and dance TSs would become solo dance TC and solo TS automatically. Others would attend technical panel schools to test for appointments.
2. A proposal to present to the U.S. Figure Skating Judges Management Subcommittee guidelines on who is qualified to judge and referee solo dance. Needs to be restructured to require a higher level than we currently have.

(Both these proposals will greatly improve the quality of panels and help non-dance chief referees at nonqualifying competitions assign appropriate officials for our solo dancers.)

3. Explore possible seminars to be held at the larger solo dance events so we can use them as training opportunities for officials (especially those interested in technical panel roles) as well as more education for coaches. The annual Solo Dance Camp in Dallas is already interesting in hosting one.

Outside of these items above, the 2022 Solo Dance Camp in Dallas was held in February. They had a record number of participants attend with more than 90, up over 30 percent from the prior camp. They are already planning to hold the camp again in 2023.

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State Games Subcommittee – Bonnie Boaz, National Vice Chair

This year was a busy year for the State Games Subcommittee.

We will have 14 State Games figure skating events in 2021-22. This is up from four State Games sanctions granted last year. The following states held or will hold State Games nonqualifying figure skating events as part of their multi-sport games: Wisconsin, Wyoming, Montana, Colorado, New York, Florida, Rhode Island, Iowa, Pennsylvania, Virginia, North Carolina, Michigan, Nebraska and Connecticut. Many of these State Games figure skating events have not been held in two years. This was the first year since COVID-19 started that all the State Games figure skating events were held. In addition Ames, Iowa, will host the 2022 State Games of America in July 2022. All of these games sought U.S. Figure Skating sanctions and used U.S. Figure Skating officials. What is especially exciting is that the majority of these events are using or will start using IJS for their events. I have been busy helping Rhode Island and Connecticut get started on transforming their former 6.0-only event to IJS and 6.0 competitions.

Again in the fall of 2021 I was contacted by the State Games of America staff to help them put together their second annual Virtual Figure Skating Event. Accountant Michael Rowland and I organized the event, and I asked 12 judges to participate. We did a 6.0 low-level event including Basic Skills, Compete USA, Excel, adult and well-balanced free skates. This gave an opportunity for skaters still affected by COVID-19 to submit videos of their free skate programs and be scored and given feedback by each judge. There were two sessions for this event, with one held in November and one in December 2021. There were a total of 37 starts. These small numbers are an indication that skaters are attending more in-person competitions.

All in all it was wonderful to get back to normal after two very quiet years for State Games competitions. I want to thank my subcommittee members for their support and all the officials who support the State Games program.

Theatre On Ice Subcommittee – Lauren Whittaker, National Vice Chair

It has been a challenging process to keep our Theatre On Ice teams engaged given the last National Theatre On Ice Competition was held in June 2019. As Theatre On Ice teams are large, with anywhere from nine to 24 athletes, the return to practices, traveling and competitions lagged behind other disciplines with smaller numbers of participants. We developed several programs to connect the teams and give them multiple opportunities to compete, both virtually and in person (in smaller events).

We developed a National Theatre On Ice Summer Series, which ran from May through August 2021. This was an opportunity for Theatre On Ice teams at all levels to receive a national ranking against other Theatre On Ice athletes/teams from all parts of the country. The competitions were held individually by member clubs nationwide in a standard format. At these competitions, Theatre On Ice teams earned official scores towards a national rank. Awards were given for top scores in both segments of the competition (choreographic exercise and free program).

A virtual event, the 2021 Theatre On Ice Virtual Challenge, was an opportunity for teams to participate in several different aspects of Theatre On Ice while also preparing for the season ahead. It consisted of three segments where teams recorded their legies or programs at their rinks and then submitted them for judging.

We held a Theatre On Ice three-part webinar series in October 2021. It consisted of three modules, Introduction to Theatre On Ice, Understanding the CE, and a Q&A.

The Nations' Cup/Adult Gold Cup which was to be hosted by The Skating Club of Boston and held in April 2022 will be held in April 2023 at The Skating Club of Boston's new facility. The event was postponed by the International TOI Committee as the European and Russian teams were unable to attend in 2022. The Skating Club of Boston was selected by the International Committee based not only on the excitement to hold the competition in Boston but the anticipation of all the new facility offers in terms of holding this event. The location and affordability of travel and hotels makes this an event which can be easily accessed for all who wish to attend.

The Skating Club of Boston will be holding a Spring Challenge Cup in April (on the weekend Nations' Cup would have been held) to give teams an opportunity to compete and receive critiques.

The National Theatre On Ice Competition will be held in Wichita, Kansas, in June 2023. The LOC has been flexible and accommodating with the postponement from the original 2020 date.
