2023 SINGLES, PAIRS AND ICE DANCE QUALIFYING SEASON ATHLETE BYE & ADVANCEMENT CRITERIA

All information is subject to change based on current information and feasibility of live international competitions.

Purpose

The purpose of this document is to outline the approved criteria for which a registered competitor may receive a bye to the 2023 Sectional Singles Final, U.S. Pairs Final and U.S. Ice Dance Final, in addition to the 2023 Toyota U.S. Figure Skating Championships.

The following bye criteria and junior advancement rules were reviewed and approved by U.S. Figure Skating's International Committee, Competitions Committee, Athletes Advisory Committee (AAC) and U.S. Figure Skating's Board of Directors as required under U.S. Figure Skating rule 2511.

Per rule 2500, all athletes receiving a bye are required to register for the 2022-23 National Qualifying Series prior to the Series Application Deadline (Sept. 20, 2022). Failure to do so will result in the competitors(s) not being entered nor allowed to compete at the U.S. Figure Skating Championships© for the current season. Additionally, all are highly encouraged to participate in the National Qualifying Series via an approved NQS competition. If athletes receiving byes choose to compete, they will not lose their bye to the Sectionals Final, U.S. Ice Dance Final and/or U.S. Pairs Final, regardless of score, nor displace an athlete who would have qualified if the said athlete had not competed.

ADVANCEMENT TO SECTIONAL SINGLES FINAL, U.S. PAIRS FINAL AND/OR U.S. ICE DANCE FINAL

For junior and senior events: Any member of the U.S. Figure Skating Team, defined in rule ICR 3.05, who has been <u>assigned to and competes</u> at an international assignment classified as an ISU Grand Prix, ISU Junior Grand Prix and or ISU Challenger Series event.

- Athletes selected to the 2022 U.S. Figure Skating World Team (not including alternates) in the same event per rule 2501 (B) (2);
- Athletes who have won a medal in the singles event at the most recent Olympic Winter Games per rule 2501 (B) (2
- Athletes who qualify for the same event at the ISU Grand Prix of Figure Skating Final or the ISU Junior Grand Prix of Figure Skating Final per rule 2501 (B) (2)
- Athletes who are assigned to and compete at three (3) international assignments classified as an ISU

Grand Prix, ISU Junior Grand Prix and or ISU Challenger Series event

- Refer to the approved list of international competitions within this document
- The top two total combined scores from each section in the Sectional Singles Final
 - Plus, next-best scores nationwide until maximum is met

SENIOR PAIRS

Maximum of 12 available spots at the U.S. Figure Skating Championships©

- Teams that placed in the top five in the same event at the 2022 Toyota U.S. Figure Skating Championships per rule 2502 (B) (2
- Teams selected to the 2022 U.S. Figure Skating World Team (not including alternates) in the same event per rule 2502 (B) (2
- Teams that have won a medal in the pairs event at the most recent Olympic Winter Games per rule 2502 (B) (2)
- Teams that qualify for the same event at the ISU Grand Prix of Figure Skating Final or the ISU Junior Grand Prix of Figure Skating Final per rule 2502 (B) (2)
- Teams that are <u>assigned to and compete</u> at three international assignments classified as a Grand Prix, Junior Grand Prix and or ISU Challenger Series event

SENIOR ICE DANCE

Maximum of 15 available spots at the U.S. Figure Skating Championships®

- Teams selected to the 2022 U.S. Figure Skating World Team (not including alternates) in the same event per rule 2503 (B) (2)
- Teams that have won a medal in the ice dance event at the most recent Olympic Winter Games per rule 2503 (B) (2)
- Teams that qualify for the same event at the ISU Grand Prix of Figure Skating Final or the ISU Junior Grand Prix of Figure Skating Final per rule 2503 (B) (2)
- Teams that are <u>assigned to and compete</u> at three international assignments classified as a Grand Prix, Junior Grand Prix and or ISU Challenger Series event
 - Refer to the approved list of international competitions within this document
- The top five teams from the U.S. Ice Dance Final
 - Plus, next-best teams from U.S. Ice Dance Final until maximum is met

JUNIOR SINGLES

Maximum of 18 available spots at the U.S. Figure Skating Championships©

- Athletes who are <u>assigned to and compete</u> at three international assignments classified as a Junior Grand Prix and or ISU Challenger Series event
 - Refer to the approved list of international competitions within this document
- The top four total combined junior scores from each section in the Sectional Singles Final
- The top two total combined novice scores each section in the Sectional Singles Final

JUNIOR PAIRS

Maximum of 12 available spots at the U.S. Figure Skating Championships©

- Teams that qualify for the same event at the ISU Junior Grand Prix of Figure Skating Final per rule 2502 (A) (1)
- Teams that are <u>assigned to and compete</u> at three (3) international assignments classified as a Junior Grand Prix and or ISU Challenger Series event
 - Refer to the approved list of international competitions within this document
- The top nine total combined scores from the nation in the U.S. Pairs Final
 - Plus, next-best teams from the U.S. Pairs Final until maximum is met

On Nov. 17, the board approved a motion via e-ballot to allow the top two finishers in novice at the 2023 U.S. Pairs Final to compete in the junior pairs event at the 2023 Toyota U.S. Figure Skating Championships as a one-year exception to rule 2502. If either of those teams chooses not to participate, no additional teams will be invited.

JUNIOR ICE DANCE

Maximum of 15 available spots at the U.S. Figure Skating Championships©

- Teams that qualify for the same event at the ISU Junior Grand Prix of Figure Skating Final per rule 2503 (A) (1)
- Teams that are <u>assigned to and compete</u> at three international assignments classified as a Junior Grand Prix and or ISU Challenger Series event
 - Refer to the approved list of international competitions within this document
- The top 12 total combined scores from the nation in the U.S. Ice Dance Final
 - Plus, next-best teams from U.S. Ice Dance Final until maximum is met

Criteria Notes

If the maximum spots allotted for byes are not met through the outlined criteria, additional competitors from the U.S. Figure Skating November Finals will be invited to fill the maximum available spots at the U.S. Figure Skating Championships© for each level/discipline. Competitors from the November Finals will be selected based on next-best total combined score(s) in the nation. This will apply equally to all disciplines in the junior and senior events.

If the number of athletes with three international assignments from the approved international competition list exceeds the number of available byes to the U.S. Figure Skating Championships©, the athletes with three international assignments will be ranked and awarded byes in the following order until there are no byes available. The remaining athletes will compete in the U.S. Figure Skating November Finals to qualify for the U.S. Figure Skating Championships©.

- Highest-to-lowest best total score in the approved list of international competitions for Grand Prix competitors
- Highest-to-lowest best total score in the approved list of international competitions for Junior Grand Prix competitors
- Highest-to-lowest best total score in the approved list of international competitions for other international competitors

Required Minimum Score

The required minimum score for all athletes to compete at the U.S. Figure Skating Championships© is under review for all disciplines and will be addressed in the fall of 2022.

Other Circumstances

No medical byes will be granted for the U.S. Figure Skating Championships© per rule 2513.

Only the athlete(s) in question may submit an appeal to U.S. Figure Skating via the Events Department at events@usfigureskating.org. The headquarters liaison will share the appeal with the chairs of the Athletes Advisory, Competitions Committee and International Committee. The liaison will coordinate a review of and vote on the matter within 48 hours of receiving the appeal and communicate the results to the athlete(s).

A bye list will be posted on <u>www.USFigureSkating.org</u> prior to the Sectional Singles Final, U.S. Pairs Final and U.S. Ice Dance Final in early November 2022 to finalize qualifying advancement numbers.
