
SECTION 1: OVERVIEW

These procedures outline the pathway for nomination to the Milano-Cortina 2026 Olympic Winter Games for U.S. Figure Skating (NGB).

The maximum Team size can be 18 athletes (a maximum of three (3) ladies, three (3) men, three (3) pairs teams and three (3) ice dance teams). However, final Team size will depend on earned International Skating Union (ISU) quota. ISU quotas are awarded to the National Olympic Committee (NOC).

SECTION 2: SELECTION PROCESS DIAGRAM

The following provides a high-level overview of how athletes will be nominated to the Team:



Note: This diagram is for informational purposes only. In the event of a conflict between the diagram and any written section herein, the written sections will take precedent.

SECTION 3: ATHLETE REQUIREMENTS

- 1. Nationality/Passports Requirements:
 - Have a valid United States passport at the time of nomination that does not expire for six months after the conclusion of the 2026 Olympic Winter Games (Games).
- 2. Minimum International Olympic Committee (IOC) Requirements:

- Abide by the rules in the Olympic Charter, including nationality/citizenship requirements.
 - For additional information regarding an athlete who is a national of two or more countries, has changed his or her nationality or acquired a new nationality, refer to the Olympic Charter (Rule 41).
- Abide by the IOC Eligibility of Conditions Form/Conditions of Participation Form
- 3. Organizing Committee Olympic Games Requirements (OCOG) Requirements:
 - Comply with all rules and policies implemented by the OCOG for Milano-Cortina 2026.
- 4. International Skating Union (ISU) Requirements:
 - To be eligible to participate in the 2026 Olympic Games, athletes must be born on or before July 1, 2008.
 - As per Rule 400.A/B, paragraph 5 of the 2022 Special Regulations Single & Pair Skating/Ice Dance, to be entered into and participate in the individual events (Women Single Skating, Men Single Skating, Pair Skating, Ice Dance) of the Olympic Winter Games, a skater/couple must have reached on or before the final entry deadline of 26 January 2026 in an ISU Championships or ISU recognized International Competition (as per Article 39 paragraph 7 of the ISU Constitution and Rule 107, paragraph 1 to 9 of the ISU General Regulations) during the ongoing or immediately preceding season the applicable minimum Combined Total Elements Score (points) established for the ISU Championships (see ISU Special Regulations Single & Pair Skating/Ice Dance, Rule 378, paragraph 4). The applicable Minimum Combined Total Elements Scores shall be decided by the ISU Council and shall be published in an ISU Communication at the beginning of the Olympic season 2025/2026.
 - Comply with all ISU eligibility requirements found here (see Qualification):
 https://olympics.com/ioc/documents/olympic-games/milano-cortina-2026-olympic-winter-games
- 5. USOPC Requirements:
 - Comply with all USOPC rules applicable to the Games (e.g., Demonstrations).
 - Complete all USOPC Games Registration requirements by the stated deadline.
 - Comply with the USOPC Delegation Terms, including the Conduct Requirements, which will be made available here: https://www.usopc.org/games-and-qualification
 - Comply with the <u>USOPC Athlete Safety Policy</u> and the <u>U.S. Center for SafeSport Code</u>.
 - Undergo a background screen in accordance with the current <u>USOPC Background Check</u>
 <u>Policy</u> if you will be age 18 or older.
- 6. NGB Requirements:
 - Comply with the NGB Athlete Agreement.
 - Comply with the NGB Code of Conduct
 - Comply with the NGB SkateSafe® Program.

- Athlete must have an active NGB membership.
- Athlete does not have an active suspension from the U.S. Center for SafeSport that would make the Athlete ineligible to participate in the Games.
- Athlete does not have an active sanction for an anti-doping rule/policy violation that would make the Athlete ineligible to participate in the Games.
- Athlete/team must possess the appropriate ISU Clearance Certificates and/or Releases if applicable.
- Athlete must adhere to the NGB Competition Readiness requirements as outlined in the Athlete Agreement.
- Athlete/team must adhere to any additional monitoring or feedback requests as defined by the U.S. Figure Skating High Performance department.
- Athlete must have completed all necessary ISU and NGB requirements for the competitive season; including but not limited to ISU Portal, Teamworks Smartabase/Hub, Music Clearance.

SECTION 4: OTHER MINIMUM REQUIREMENTS TO BE ELIGIBLE FOR THE TEAM

- Meet the U.S. Center for SafeSport's education and training requirements in accordance with the <u>USOPC Athlete Safety Policy</u> if you will be 18 or older on the day after the Closing Ceremony.
- Agree to be bound by and adhere to all IOC, WADA, ISU, USADA and USOPC anti-doping protocols, policies and procedures, as applicable. This includes participation in Out-of-Competition Testing and an agreement to be bound to the results management authority of the IOC, WADA, ISU, USADA, or other Anti-Doping Organization as applicable.
- Meet all health and safety protocols, to include vaccine requirements and/or testing requirements set forth by the government, local laws, USOPC, ISU and/or the OCOG.

SECTION 5: EVALUATIVE EVENTS

Event names, dates and locations of all trials, competitions, and camps to be used as part of the selection process:

Athletes being considered for nomination to the Games will be evaluated on their performance at any of the events on the calendar listed below starting with the 2025 U.S. Figure Skating Championships.

U.S. Figure Skating's International Committee approved domestic and international calendar <u>HERE</u>

It is the responsibility of each athlete to regularly check the calendar of events to ensure they are aware of all schedule changes. Additionally, it is anticipated that the dates and locations of Challenger Series events will be added to the calendar in June 2025.

SECTION 6: SELECTION PROCESS

Provide a step-by-step description of the selection process including an overview of the ISU Qualification System.

6.1 TOTAL QUOTA PLACES:

In accordance with the <u>ISU Qualification System for the 2026 Olympic Winter Games</u>, U.S. Figure Skating can qualify up to a maximum of three (3) ladies, three (3) men, three (3) pairs teams and three (3) ice dance teams to the 2026 Olympic Winter Games for a maximum total Team size of 18 athletes.

Final Team size will depend on earned ISU quota and ISU quotas are awarded to the NOC. Nomination of athletes to the Games for all quota places earned is at the discretion of U.S. Figure Skating with approval by the USOPC.

In addition, U.S. Figure Skating may qualify to compete in the Team Event provided the U.S. qualifies as one (1) of the ten (10) best national teams from NOCs based on qualifying points as outlined in the ISU_Qualification System for the 2026 Olympic Winter Games. The process used for determining the athletes/teams to compete in the Team Event is described in detail below (see Section 6.4).

6.2 EVALUATION EVENT QUALIFICATION PATHWAY:

6.2.1 Athlete qualification pathway:

Athletes first qualify for the International Selection Pool (ISP) by achieving a score determined by the respective discipline group and communicated to athletes and coaches on usfigureskating.org. Athletes/teams can be added to the ISP throughout the season upon meeting the minimum score.

Qualification to each of the events linked within the international calendar is dependent on the type of event.

- Grand Prix: Selection based on World Standing
 - Exception: Skate America athletes are selected by respective Discipline Groups as they are not based on World Standing
- Junior Grand Prix: Determined by respective discipline group
- Challenger Series: Determined by respective discipline group
- Other International: Determined by respective discipline group
- ISU <u>Championship Event</u>: Selection based on selection procedures published on usfigureskating.org.

In accordance with ISU published deadlines, athletes are assigned to events by the discipline group for each respective discipline as outlined in their Athlete Agreement.

6.2.2 Athlete Pool:

To create a pool of athletes/teams to be considered for nomination for the Games, the following criteria will be used:

A. The top five (5) athletes/teams based on the "Calculation of Overall Athlete Performance Data" will be added to the pool. This data will use a factoring calculation of the scores achieved at the events listed and outlined in Appendix B.

Note: Events must meet the criteria for Eligible Events as defined by the ISU in Communication #1629, page 4, paragraphs C.1.4 and C.2.3 to be used as part of the nomination process

In addition to the Calculation of Overall Athlete Performance Data (Appendix B), the top five (5) athletes/teams at the 2026 U.S. Figure Skating Championships, top ten (10) at the immediately preceding World Championships, any athlete that has medaled at a previous Olympic Games in their discipline only, and any athlete/team in the current season's Top 24 in World Rankings will be placed into the pool, if eligible based on age and skating level, regardless of whether they meet the requirements in Section 6.2.2 (A).

Additional athletes/teams may be added to the pool by the respective Selection Committee based on the discretionary selection criteria outlined in Section 7. An athlete/team will be added to the pool if approved by a 2/3 majority of the respective Selection Committee (see Section 7.3).

- B. Petition Athletes. Athletes/teams who qualified to compete but did not compete or complete both segments of the competition at any of the events listed in Section 5 due to injury or illness, verified by U.S. Figure Skating medical personnel, may still be considered for nomination to the Athlete Pool by submitting an athlete petition by the start of the selection meeting for each Discipline Group at the 2026 U.S. Championships. The meeting times will be determined and communicated a week prior to the start of the 2026 U.S. Championships.
 - Athletes must submit petitions in writing to Justin Dillon (<u>jdillon@usfigureskating.org</u>).

 - In the case of a petition based upon an injury or illness, the petition must be accompanied by a licensed physician's statement, and the nature and extent of that injury or illness is subject to verification by a physician approved by U.S Figure Skating.
 - U.S. Figure Skating medical personnel must verify that the athlete(s) will be physically ready to compete at the Games.
 - To be considered for nomination by petition, the athlete/team must prove competitive

readiness by performing complete competition programs (SP/RD, FS/FD) with all planned program elements with timing determined by the International Committee, as approved and reviewed by a monitoring panel to be determined by the International Committee.

- Athlete petitions will be evaluated by the respective Selection Committee based on the discretionary selection criteria outlined in Section 7.
- If the petition is accepted, the athlete/team will be added to the Athlete Pool.

6.3 NOMINATION TO THE TEAM:

From the pool of eligible athletes/teams, the respective Selection Committee (see Section 7.3) will nominate athletes/teams using the discretionary criteria outlined in Section 7. The Selection Committee may also nominate up to three (3) substitute athletes/teams in rank order.

If any of the athletes/teams nominated to the Team do not obtain the combined ISU minimum technical score requirements for the SP/RD, FS/FD 21 days before the first official practice day of the Games (same as entry deadline), the highest ranked substitute athlete/team who has achieved the combined ISU minimum technical score for the SP/RD, FS/FD will be nominated to the Team. The listed scores can be found in ISU Communication 2657 for the 2024/25 season and will be updated once published for the 2025/26 season.

In the event of a conflict between this overview and the ISU Qualification System, the ISU Qualification System will take precedent. 6.4 TEAM EVENT AT THE GAMES:

The athletes/teams competing in the Team Event at the Games must be nominated athletes/teams for the 2026 U.S. Olympic Team in the individual disciplines.

i. Team Event Format at the Games

After the short programs/rhythm dance of the Team Event are concluded at the Games, the top five (5) countries with the highest number of aggregate placement points will qualify athletes/teams to compete in the free skate program of the Team Event. The Team Event athletes/teams competing in the free skate/free dance segments will be the same athletes/teams who competed in the short programs. However, each country is allowed to substitute up to two (2) entries (men, ladies, pairs or ice dance) for the free skate/free dance segments from the other athletes on their Team.

ii. Selection for Team Event

One week prior to the 2026 U.S. Figure Skating Championships, five (5) members of the International Committee (the IC Chair, U.S. Figure Skating USOPC AAC Representative and

International Committee Discipline Vice Chairs for singles, pairs, and ice dance), along with three non-voting attendees (Senior Director of Athlete High Performance, International Committee Past Chair and the ISU Representative) will meet to discuss strategy and review the disciplines using the international events listed in Section 5. The IC Discipline Subcommittees will determine a strategy to select the athletes/teams to compete in the Team Event during the selection meetings at the 2026 U.S. Figure Skating Championships.

The selection of athletes/teams for the Team Event will be based on the Discretionary Selection Criteria (Section 7) and discussions with the athletes/teams and coaches. The Calculation of Overall Athlete Performance Data (Appendix B) and body of work of the athletes/teams within the twelve month period will be used to determine which athletes/teams will have priority in competing in the Team Event. The selection of the participants in both the short program/rhythm dance and free skate/free dance will be made with the best strategy for podium placement in the Team Event. The selection decisions for the Team Event will be made by the Senior Director of Athlete High Performance and the respective discipline group.

The determination of which two (2) athletes/teams to substitute will be based on which disciplines have the best opportunity to medal and/or provide the strongest field in the individual events. The disciplines with the best opportunity to medal will have the first option of substitution in the Team Event if the U.S. qualifies for the free skate.

It will be the responsibility of the athlete/team to accept or decline participation in the Team Event.

SECTION 7: DISCRETIONARY CRITERIA TO NOMINATE ATHLETES RATIONALE FOR UTILIZING

7.1 DISCRETIONARY SELECTION

It has been the experience of U.S. Figure Skating that the athletes who have had the most success at the international level are those who have demonstrated consistent performances as opposed to the athletes who only have a single great performance. Therefore, by using discretionary selection criteria, U.S. Figure Skating can nominate the athletes who have the best chance to win the maximum number of medals at the Games.

7.2 DEFINE THE DISCRETIONARY CRITERIA TO BE USED:

To field the most competitive Team, the Selection Committee will take into consideration the criteria set forth below, which includes scores and placements in events, difficulty of the field, performance impact, and head-to-head match ups, to determine the athletes/teams who will have the best chance to win the maximum number of medals at the Games.

- Calculation of performance data of athletes/teams in the athlete pool as listed in Appendix B.
 - This data will include competition results and other reports/data relating to detailed results

sheets of the competitions listed in Section 5.

- The data will provide a body of work within a twelve-month period that demonstrates the athlete's/team's consistency and ability to achieve medal potential scores at the Games.
- The technical elements, program components and total score data derived from protocols after the conclusion of each segment of competition specifically looking at consistency, competitiveness, and trending scores, will be a primary focus on discussing the ranking of the athletes/teams and determining the athletes that will have the most performance impact at the Games
- All athletes in the Athlete Pool will be evaluated on the selection criteria outlined above.

The Selection Committee will formally meet as soon as practical, after the conclusion of the competition at the 2026 U.S. Figure Skating Championships for each respective discipline (women, men, ice dance, pairs) or at the conclusion of all of the Championships disciplines to determine the respective nominees to the Team and substitute athletes in ranked order. A quorum of the Selection Committee must be present for the nominated athletes to the Team to be official. A quorum is defined as a two-thirds majority of the Selection Committee present either in person or via ZOOM and/or telephone conference call. A two-thirds majority vote of the Selection Committee actually voting is needed to approve the nominations and substitute athletes/teams.

7.3 SELECTION COMMITTEE

The committee that will be responsible for making discretionary selections or other decisions and recommendations directly impacting athletes in the selection process.

SECTION 8: MANDATORY TRAINING AND/OR COMPETITION

NGB does not plan to hold any mandatory training for the Team in advance of the Games. Should this change, NGB will provide the location and training schedule to all nominated athletes a minimum of thirty (30) days in advance of the mandatory training.

SECTION 9: DATE OF TEAM NOMINATION

NGB will nominate the Team, including any replacements/alternates to the USOPC on or before January 12, 2026.

The nomination of athletes and substitutes in rank order will be announced to all athletes in the Athlete Pool via email. A press release on U.S. Figure Skating's website will also be posted immediately following the respective nominations meeting. Additionally, nominated athletes will receive an assignment letter in the days following the nominations.

SECTION 10: REMOVAL OF ATHLETES FROM THE TEAM 10.1 NGB JURISDICTION

NGB has jurisdiction over athlete nominees until athlete entries have been submitted by the USOPC to the Organizing Committee of the Olympic Games.

- a. An athlete who is nominated to the Team by NGB may be removed for any of the following reasons, as determined by NGB:
 - i. <u>Voluntary withdrawal</u>. Athlete submits a written letter to the NGB Executive Director requesting to voluntarily withdraw from the Team.
 - ii. <u>Injury or illness</u>. A physician (or medical staff) approved by NGB provides certification that the Athlete has a debilitating condition. If Athlete refuses to provide verification of their illness or injury by a physician (or medical staff), their injury will be assumed to be debilitating, and they may be removed from the Team.
 - iii. <u>Failure to participate</u>. Athlete does not participate in all Mandatory Training and/or Competition as defined in these procedures.
 - iv. Code of Conduct Violation. Athlete violates the NGB Code of Conduct
 - v. Violation of U.S. Figure Skating's Competition Compliance Agreement: Appendix A
 - vi. <u>Athlete Agreement</u>. Athlete fails to sign, or athlete violates a term in their signed NGB Athlete Agreement and/or Competition Readiness Agreement.
 - vii. Non-compliance. Athlete does not meet the athlete eligibility requirements listed in Section 3 and Section 4 of these selection procedures.
 - viii. Athlete/team fails to obtain the minimum technical score requirements for the Games in both segments (SP/RD, FS/FD) at an ISU recognized international competition.
- b. An Athlete may be removed as a nominee to the Team or from the Team if found to have violated

IOC, WADA, ISU, USADA and/or USOPC anti-doping protocol, policies and procedures, the U.S. Center for SafeSport Code, the USOPC Athlete Safety Policy and NGB SafeSport policies, as applicable.

10.2 USOPC JURISDICTION

- a. Once Athlete entries have been submitted by the USOPC to the Organizing Committee of the Olympic Games, the USOPC has jurisdiction over the Team.
- b. USOPC's Delegation Conduct Requirements apply in addition to the NGB Code of Conduct. The Delegation Conduct Requirements in the USOPC Games Delegation Terms are specific to each Games and are made available during the Games registration process.
- c. The USOPC's Grievance Procedures and Hearing Process are found within the USOPC Dispute Resolution Policy and Hearing Procedures.
 - i. See www.usopc.org/governance/dispute-resolution for more information.

SECTION 11: SELECTION PROCESS IF ATHLETE VACANCY OCCURS PRIOR TO SUBMISSION OF ENTRIES BY NAME TO THE ORGANIZING COMMITTEE OF THE OLYMPIC GAMES

- 11.1 Should a vacancy occur prior to submission of Entries by Name by the USOPC to the OCOG, NGB will nominate the next highest ranked substitute athlete/team.
- 11.2 All replacement athletes must meet all requirements listed in Sections 3-4.

SECTION 12: SELECTION PROCESS IF ATHLETE VACANCY OCCURS AFTER SUBMISSION OF ENTRIES BY NAME TO THE ORGANIZING COMMITTEE OF THE OLYMPIC GAMES

- 12.1 Should a vacancy occur after submission of Entries by Name by the USOPC to the OCOG, if allowed, NGB will nominate the next highest ranked substitute athlete/team.
- 12.2 All replacement athletes must meet all requirements listed in Sections 3-4.

SECTION 13: RIGHT TO A HEARING

An athlete who is removed from the Team has the right to a hearing per the <u>NGB's complaint procedures</u>. The U.S. Figure Skating Bylaws and Grievance and Disciplinary Procedures (Article XXV) starting at GCR 1.00 and the USOPC Bylaws, Section 9 (https://www.usopc.org/governance/dispute-resolution).

SECTION 14: REQUIRED DOCUMENTS

In addition to the USOPC Delegation Conduct Requirements, the following documents are required to be signed by an athlete as a condition of nomination to the Olympic Games:

- NGB Code of Conduct
- NGB Athlete Agreement

SECTION 15: DISCLAIMERS

These procedures are based on IOC and ISU rules and regulations as presently known and understood. Any change in the selection procedures caused by a change in IOC and/or ISU rules and regulations will be distributed to the affected athletes immediately. The selection criteria are based on the latest information available to NGB.

However, the selection criteria are always subject to unforeseen, intervening circumstances, and realistically may not have accounted for every possible contingency. If any force of nature, pandemic, or force majeure, should cause the alteration or cancellation of any of the selection events listed in this document, these selection procedures may require revisions, pursuant to their resubmission to the USOPC.

SECTION 16: CONFLICT OF INTEREST

All members of the Selection Committee (Section 7.3) and all individuals who developed these selection procedures (Section 21) must comply with the NGB's Conflict of Interest Policy, to include completing and submitting a disclosure form consistent with the NGB's Conflict of Interest Policy before convening the committee.

A conflict of interest exists when a personal, family, financial, professional, club, team or business relationship interferes with, or may be perceived to interfere with a committee member's ability to be impartial and participate in the selection process in a fair and impartial manner. Any member of the Selection Committee who has an actual, possible, or perceived conflict of interest must disclose it to the NGB's Grievance and Ethics Committee prior to the start of the selection process and may be required to recuse themself from the Selection Committee discussions and/or voting.

If a conflict exists, the NGB's Grievance and Ethics Committee shall review the conflict and determine the committee member's level of involvement (e.g., whether that committee member must recuse themself from participating in discussions and/or voting).

During its review, the NGB Grievance and Ethics Committee may ask a Selection Committee member or an affected person for more information at its discretion. For example, if a Selection Committee member is required to recuse themself from voting, the NGB Grievance and Ethics Committee may still determine that a Selection Committee member who has relevant and necessary information related to athlete performance, such as a national team coach or high performance director, may, if requested by the Selection Committee, provide that information to the Selection Committee if the information is provided in a fair and unbiased

manner and if the Selection Committee member with the conflict of interest does not vote toward the final decision.

Additionally, any person with a good faith belief that a committee member has a conflict of interest may report the alleged conflict of interest to the NGB's Grievance and Ethics Committee at grievance@usfigureskating.org. Reports may also be made anonymously through the USOPC's Integrity Portal. No committee member shall retaliate in any way against a person who, in good faith, reports an alleged conflict of interest. In addition, the USOPC maintains a strict no retaliation policy that prohibits any employee, contractor, agent, volunteer, or member of the USOPC to take or threaten to take any action against an athlete for reporting information to or seeking assistance from the Office of the Athlete Ombuds.

Any recused individual shall be replaced in accordance with the NGB Selection Committee appointment process.

SECTION 18: GRIEVANCES

The U.S. Figure Skating Bylaws and Grievance and Disciplinary Procedures (Article XXV, Page 31 in the 2024-25 Rulebook) can be found on the U.S. Figure Skating website <u>HERE</u>.

Section 9 of the USOPC Bylaws provides a process for an athlete to file a complaint with the USOPC against an NGB alleging that they have been denied, or threatened to be denied, with the opportunity to participate in a Protected Competition, as defined in the USOPC bylaws. SECTION 19: NON-RETALIATION

The USOPC and NGB have zero tolerance for retaliation against people who make good faith reports of potential ethical, policy, or legal violations, or who cooperate with investigations of those reports. That means no USOPC or NGB staff, Board or Committee member, or volunteer may threaten, harass, discriminate against, or take any negative employment or related action (e.g., discharge, demotion, suspension, negative review) on that basis.

SECTION 20: SUPPORTING DOCUMENTS

NGB will retain the approved Selection Procedures and all supporting documents, including scouting or evaluation forms, etc., and data from the selection process as required by the NGB Record Retention Policy or for six months past the date of the Closing Ceremony of the Games, whichever is longer.

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APPENDIX A - U.S. FIGURE SKATING'S COMPETITION COMPLIANCE AGREEMENT

Per U.S. Figure Skating's Competition Compliance Agreement, any athlete injured and/or ill to the extent that requires surgery and/or ongoing medical treatment and/or is otherwise unable to train consistently, effectively, and according to their seasonal plan, and which may therefore jeopardize the athlete's ability to compete for Team USA, the athlete agrees to communicate the situation to U.S. Figure Skating Senior Director, Athlete High Performance, with a copy to U.S. Figure Skating Director, High Performance Medical and Performance Services and U.S. Figure Skating Manager, Team USA. Under such circumstances, the athlete authorizes U.S. Figure Skating to request a Return to Play Plan & Status Report. Upon receiving the Return to Play Plan & Status Report, U.S. Figure Skating may share the information with the International Committee Chair and the Chair of the Sports Science and Medicine Committee and/or the Vice Chair of Medical Services for the Sports Science and Medicine Committee. This information will be handled with the utmost discretion and will be used to enable U.S. Figure Skating to help facilitate access to services that may support the athlete's effort to recover.

In addition, any injury/illness occurring after nomination of the Team must be reported to medical@usfigureskating.org within 24 hours of occurrence and/or knowledge (whichever occurs first) of the injury/illness by the athlete and/or coach. The Senior Director, Athlete High Performance and the International Chair will be notified by the Director, High Performance Medical and Performance Services regarding the injury/illness. Depending on the severity of the injury or illness, the athlete authorizes U.S. Figure Skating to request a Return to Play Plan & Status Report from the Director, High Performance Medical and Performance Services. After the review of the Return to Play & Status Report, U.S. Figure Skating reserves the right to assemble an injury/illness evaluation group and meet via conference call.

The evaluation group shall include:

- o U.S. Figure Skating, Senior Director of Athlete High Performance
- Director, High Performance Medical and Performance Services
- Medical representative for U.S. Figure Skating
- U.S. Figure Skating International Committee Chair
- Athlete's physician diagnosing the injury or illness
- Primary coach of the athlete

The athlete or the parents of the athlete, if a minor, may also participate in the meeting to discuss the injury or illness. The athlete will also be provided with the option to have an athlete representative as part of the evaluation group; however, this is not mandatory as such evaluations concern protected health information.

The purpose of the evaluation group is to provide the athlete, in a confidential manner, a support mechanism to communicate factual information to aid in the recovery and allow the athlete to compete at

the highest level at the Games.

The athlete's support staff (medical team, coach, etc.) will develop a plan to provide:

- A timeline for recovery and training that will achieve the performance goal agreed upon by the evaluation group.
- A timeline for communication on the progress of the athlete.

The primary coach of the next replacement (alternate) athlete and / or the replacement athlete may be notified by the International Committee Chair that a replacement may be needed depending on the severity of the injury or illness with a timeline to be determined.

If the athlete is unable to progress in the timeline approved by the evaluation group, the coach and athlete must notify the Senior Director, Athlete High Performance and a follow-up conference call will be arranged to discuss the options for the athlete. The Team USA AC representative for U.S. Figure Skating will be included in this meeting.

At this point the athlete will decide whether to withdraw, or if the athlete decides that he/she is not ready to withdraw from the event, then the following will occur:

- 1. The evaluation group will work with the athlete and support staff to adjust the timeline, or
- 2. If it is determined by the evaluation group, in its sole discretion, that it is not in the best interest of the athlete and/or U.S. Figure Skating for the athlete to attend the Olympic Games, the evaluation group will recommend to the International Committee Chair that the athlete is replaced by the next (substitute) athlete. The Chair of the International Committee will take the recommendation of the evaluation group to a vote by the appropriate Discipline Group to replace the athlete.

An athlete who is removed from the Team pursuant to this provision has the right to a hearing per U.S. Figure Skating's Constitution and Bylaws. APPENDIX D - GLOSSARY

Contingency means a future event or circumstance which is possible but cannot be predicted with certainty.

Delegation Event means the Olympic Games, the Olympic Winter Games, the Paralympic Games, the Paralympic Winter Games, the Pan American Games, and the Parapan American Games.

Force Majeure means an event or effect that cannot be reasonably anticipated or controlled (e.g., hurricane, tornado, etc.).

Grievance Procedures means the process that enables an athlete to file a complaint with the NGB or USOPC.

Jurisdiction means the power or authority to make decisions and judgments.

Nominated means an athlete, coach or staff member whose name has been submitted to the USOPC by an NGB for participation in a Delegation Event.

Protected Competition means a Delegation Event or a Qualifying Competition.

Qualifying Competition means either of the following:

- 2. **NGB Qualifying Competition:** Any competition or activity organized or approved by the NGB where the athlete's performance or results are considered in the published selection criteria to represent the United States in a Delegation Event.
- 3. **International Qualifying Competition**: Any international sport competition where (i) athletes represent the United States against athletes representing other nations, (ii) the NGB officially designates entrants, as required by the competition organizers, and (iii) athlete results or performance are included in the published criteria to qualify, or be selected, to represent the United States in a Delegation Event.

Selected means an athlete, coach or staff member whose name has been submitted by the USOPC to the OCOG at the final submission date, as determined by the OCOG.
